
MISSION:



CRITICAL AND TIMELY ISSUES

According to the COVID Tracking Project Black Americans are dying at nearly 3x the rate of white Americans. in part these rates are exacerbated by socioeconomic factors such as employment status & healthcare access

Given the horrific deaths Black Americans, like George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery, Bree Black, Breonna Taylor, and countless more--A number of agencies, cities, counties, and even states have declared racism a public health crisis.

Public Health Crisis Declaration

^{*}Updated as of July 20th, 2020. This data may not include all cities, counties, or national agencies that have declared racism as a public health crisis.




Outcomes & Projections

Since many of the declarations are still in early phases, the outcomes of these resolutions are difficult to determine.

Supporters of the declaration, as noted by Pew Trusts, are intended to incite change across all sectors of government including, criminal justice, education, health care, housing, transportation, budgets and taxes, economic development and social services.

Overarching goal is to shrink the health gap between Black Americans and White Americans.

Reallocation of Budget Funds Towards Education

MAYOR MARY WALSH OF BOSTON EXAMPLE

2 0 % OR 12 MILLION OF THE BOSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT'S OVERTIME BUDGET TO INVEST IN EQUITY AND INCLUSION

- \$1 million to support trauma teams and counseling services at the BPHC
- \$2 million to fund community-based programs, such as violence intervention grants, youth programming, language and food access, immigrant advancement
- \$2 million for additional public mental health services

- \$2 million to support economic development initiatives for minority and women owned businesses
- \$2 million to provide additional housing supports and youth homelessness programs
