Undocumented Immigrants and COVID

- According to the Pew Research Center, 10.5 million undocumented immigrants reside in the U.S. as of 2017
- Lack of health insurance and fear of legal status are major obstacles in accessing care



Undocumented Immigrants and COVID

- Minority voices oftentimes minimized in medical settings
 - Only exacerbated by language barrier
- High risk of spread in jobs
 - Usually unskilled labor
 - Often essential work in food supply or retailing
 - Employers may not adhere to proper regulations or guidelines

Undocumented Immigrants and COVID

- Furloughing or unemployment takes harder toll on undocumented population
 - No government aid
 - Suffer similar issues faced by all Americans in terms of rent, food, and other costs without similar support networks
- Funeral costs present different challenge as body repatriation is common
 - Community already faces elevated financial strain

Final Reflections

- Policy options must be explored at all levels of government to resolve issues
- Experience has allowed for focus on my concentration through relevant research and use coursework in real world application
- Firsthand experience understanding role and impact of nonprofits in community
- Encouraged critical thinking of policy solutions to social issues
